Presented to South Presbyterian Church on the Occasion of its 175th Anniversary





Proclamation

Office of The Monroe County Executive, Adam I. Bello

WHEREAS, In 1849, parents in the suburb of West Brighton spurred by the increasing frequency of their children's misbehavior identified a need for a Sunday School, and so the South Presbyterian Church was founded. Congregants met every Sunday afternoon in a one-room, red brick schoolhouse, where William B. Levet lead the youth program; and

WHEREAS, After nearly 50 years of teaching Sunday School at this location, the schoolhouse group voted to construct a church building, named The West Brighton Chapel Society. Construction began in 1899 as Rochester was growing into a bustling city, and by 1920, the name changed to West Brighton Presbyterian Church, and again in 1924 to South Presbyterian Church. Over the years, various church activities were added including youth groups, the young people's society, junior choir, senior quartet, a Boy Scout troupe, vacation Bible school, and adult Bible study; and

WHEREAS, Even during the challenges and diminishing income of the Great Depression, church membership continued to grow, adding three choirs and a Girl Scout troupe. By the late 1930s, the church hosted two services every Sunday morning in order to accommodate all worshipers and Sunday School membership neared 200, with an almost equal amount of adult enrollment; and

WHEREAS, A growing church required another building expansion, completed in 1953 with the ability to accommodate more than 500 worshipers, and the church continued its investment in its music program. By the mid-80s, the church honoring their commitment to inclusion added physical accessibility accommodations as well as hearing loops in the sanctuary and social hall; and

WHEREAS, The new century continued the rich heritage of building community through education, the arts and social engagement. In 2015, South Presbyterian Church merged with New Life Presbyterian Church, and over the next three years, the two groups thoughtfully and compassionately blended their congregations into one; and

WHEREAS, The COVID-19 pandemic brought on challenges, but the community seamlessly adopted a digital presence through online Bible studies, evening prayer, social gatherings, book groups, hymn signs, daily meditations and weekly worship; and

WHEREAS, The historic cultural past of South Presbyterian Church is still embraced through worship, service and song. Today, we celebrate 175 successful years of South Presbyterian Church and thank them for continued investments and dedication to their congregants and Monroe County.

Now therefore, I, Adam J. Bello, Monroe County Executive, do hereby proclaim

September 23, 2023 to be a day to honor and celebrate:

SOUTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH 175TH ANNIVERSARY





Dear Friends in Christ:

I regret that I cannot be there with you on the auspicious occasion of the 175th Anniversary Celebration.

Reflecting on the work we did together throughout my tenure as the Presbytery Leader of the Presbytery of Genesee Valley has taken me back to so many meetings – primarily with the sessions of SPC and New Life, as each tackled the big questions of Who Are We? What Are We Here For? Who Is Our Neighbor?, in light of the changing nature of each community and the larger community. It was faithful, painstaking, sometimes pain-full, and often exhilarating work.

I came to you with experience as the former Pastor of the Irving Park Presbyterian Church in Chicago, and as presbytery staff for congregational transformation in three different presbyteries. Certainly, learnings from those places earned me a little wisdom. As I said when I was interviewed, "I know as much as anyone in the country about what doesn't work." And something about what does. Most importantly, I came with the hope of engaging in faithful experimentation wrapped in prayerful discernment. I adopted the method of the importunate widow – keep on asking for what God is calling you to.

In my line of work, I heard often that the chief role of any institution is to say No to new ideas. I was determined to keep questions open long enough to get past the automatic "we don't do it that way," to allow the Holy Spirit some room for action. Questions such as "What if?" and "Why not?" need some time and some air to emerge. I am grateful that you were willing to work in this way. You put it so well in your prayer, "Put us where you want us and show us what to do."

Most of all, I hope you felt my encouragement, for these ministries have required real courage, particularly at the beginning. I fielded more than a few questions and comments on your behalf by saying (as I still believe) that there is more than one way of being church in the Presbytery of Genesee Valley. And if there isn't the Presbytery is in trouble. I am grateful that the Presbytery voted its approval along the way. Who could imagine how many persons have been touched by the Acts of Faith and the teaching ministry of FireBird Spirit?



It is my pleasure to share with you and the Recognition Reception attendees, the words and thoughts expressed by Sister Elaine Hollis, Chaplain, Amy Kheyfits, Director of Operations and myself on the truly remarkable work that occurred between you, the dedicated volunteer group and the Rochester Psychiatric Center (RPC). This endeavor was truly ground-breaking and unprecedented. As a group, we were the first in NYS and the first OMH facility serving forensic patients to have dedicated volunteers create a new worship community within a Forensic Unit!

For several years and until Covid struck and changed our ability to welcome people into the facility, Pastor Deb and her volunteers from the church provided needed and welcomed services on a regular basis both on the Adult Services Unit (ASU) side of the building and the Rochester Forensic Unit (RFU) side. Her musical ability to play almost anything on the piano added to the joy people felt as they participated in these services. Every week that she came, there was a program which participants could keep for further reflection. When the volunteer group was no longer able to come into the building, the Church provided DVD's that could be used with our folks for their spiritual enrichment. For a long time after Pastor Deb and her committed group of volunteers stopped coming to the facility due to Covid, numerous patients and staff would ask when they were going to return since they had found the services so meaningful and enriching. All of the volunteers who came so faithfully made it a point to get to know our folks and to engage in individual conversations with them. Their work was truly a blessing and has made a lasting impact on our patients, staff and facility!
